
How to use online archives of Rotterdam, Netherlands

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Activate the Internet:



Example 1

At home your main internet screen will look different from the one you see here at the Family History Library computers.

Now type: http://www.gemeentearchief.rotterdam.nl in the address box




Example 2

and press Enter-key on keyboard or click on green arrow () in upper right hand area of screen. See red arrow in Example 2. Next the Homepage for the Rotterdam archives appears on the monitor screen which looks as follows:

In the upper right corner of the screen you will see some icons with words under them which look as shown below:




When you click on the word English or the flag icon the words will be converted over into English, see example below:




Example 5

This action will also translate the words in the left hand margin, which is dark blue, and also the instructions on ensuing pages. However, it will not change the information from Dutch to English of the Homepage.






The following screen appears showing a listing of records that are available.


Now click on the word Zoeken which means Search in Dutch, see arrow above.

After clicking on Zoeken the following screen will be displayed:





Rotterdam has made Extracts available free of charge taken from church records from 1575-1811 and Civil records from 1812-1959. You just have to mark the appropriate box or boxes and fill out the period for which you desire to make a search. Next item is the Town/City that your ancestor was born, married or died in. You may skip that item and leave All Cities in that box and you will see extracts for various cities under the jurisdiction of Rotterdam. Below is shown a list of the cities whose records can be viewed:

If you want to zero in on a particular city just move the cursor to the city of your choice and click.

Next fill in the family (last) name or surname of your ancestor for whom you are trying to locate some information. Next is the Infix sometimes called a Prefix and finally the first name(s) or the given name(s) of the person for whom you are looking.

A few things need to be explained for those not too familiar with the Dutch language.

Many names in the Netherlands have Infixes or Prefixes which are not really physically attached to the name but are nevertheless an integral part of the Last Name. Examples of Infixes or Prefixes are: van, van de, van der, de, der, des, ter, 't, etc. Here is an example of a name with an Infix: van der Meulen. Here in the USA we usually write such a name as one word: Vandermeulen but not so in the Netherlands. Such names are always alphabetized under the main part of the Last Name never under the Infix or Prefix. Thus, van der Meulen will be listed under Meulen and you have to enter Meulen in the slot for family name. The "van der" part of


the name is usually found in one of two places: 1) right after the main part of the last name, thus: Meulen van der, or 2) after the last name and any given name(s), thus: Meulen, Johannes van der. These are the two possibilities that you may encounter. Here in the Rotterdam archive you have a separate box for the Infix. If there is no Infix or Prefix in the name of the person you are looking for, leave the Infix box blank!

Below is a screen that has been filled out with name for whom a search needs to be made.

Now click on Search and the following information will be displayed if it is available:


If no information was found you may have to Search again using different criteria. Here we found the data for whom we were looking. In order to see more details on this person click either on the name or the box in front of the name (it is actually an icon of a document).

The new screen displays the names of both father and mother, the actual date of birth, the birth city and the Birth Certificate number (akte nr. 1498).

NOTE: Akte = Certificate, nr.= abbreviation for number in Dutch.

If you want a hard copy or a digital copy via e-mail, click on the little down arrow, see example above.

Next you must click on the box that states "Order copy". There most likely will be a charge for for either the hard copy or the digital copy via e-mail. To return to your request click on the box "Back to results" which is shown in Example 13.

Here is an example of a MARRIAGE in Rotterdam. We have used the father of the person whose birth information we found. The father's name was Johannes Adrianus van der Meulen. Here is the initial search screen.

Note, that a specific city was not indicated this time. Here is the result of the search:

Once again click on either the name or the little box in front of the name (it is actually an icon of a document).

Here is the screen that will show the marriage information:

It gives you the name of the bride and groom and their ages at time of marriage. It also gives you the names of the parents as far as these are available. Again you can order a paper copy or a digital copy via e-mail. It also give you the Source (=Bron) Rotterdam 1853 a39v but no Certificate number is given which happens every so often.

Here is an example of a DEATH in Rotterdam. The father's name of the child that passed away is Johannes Adrianus van der Meulen. The child in question is Maria Gerardina van der Meulen. She was born 25 Jan 1859. Here is the initial search screen.

Example 20

Here we have a dilemma: two young ladies with the same name who passed away. Quite often they will indicate how old a child is at time of death. So that may help. Let us take a look. We know that she was born 25 Jan 1859.

She was about 5 months (=maanden) old at time of death, as she died in June of 1859 she must have been born in January of 1859. Thus, this child is most likely to be the one we are looking for.

Now let us click on the second child that died and view what her Death Certificate says

Here is the death information on the second young lady.



Example 23

It indicates that she died twenty days (=dagen) after her birth. By examining her death date it can easily be seen that this child is not the one you are looking for, hence it is the first young lady by this name for whom you were searching.

This is the final segment of usage of the Rotterdam archives website.

Below are a few words in Dutch with their English counterparts that may be useful to you.

dag = day, dagen = days week = week, weken = weeks

maand = month, maanden = months jaar = year, jaren = years

akte = certificate, akten = certificates
