### What is a Wiki?

A wiki is a website where all available information on a topic is gathered in a central location for easy access. On some wikis users can add, modify, or delete its content. Wikis are typically powered by wiki software and are often created collaboratively, by multiple users. Examples include community websites, corporate intranets, knowledge management systems, and note taking.

The most famous wiki in existence today is Wikipedia.org. It is the world's largest encyclopedia, which is written entirely by volunteers. In 2008, FamilySearch launched its own wiki to provide guidance about how to do genealogical research.

### FamilySearch Research Wiki



Because no one can be an expert in all localities, records, languages, or ethnic groups, the purpose of the Research Wiki is to collaborate and share knowledge designed to encourage and eventually enable all people, anywhere in the world, to know where to find, how to use, and how to analyze genealogy records about their ancestors.


### The Indexing Wiki

The indexing wiki was created to provide a central site were information could be accessed easily and changed quickly. The Wiki provides indexers with much more information about a project than we are able to include within the indexing program. New English language indexing projects are being linked to the Family-Search indexing Wiki. It is used to assist patrons and missionaries in their indexing efforts.

- Indexing presentations




### How To Access the Indexing Wiki







#### **About This Project**

Beginning in 1790, a federal census has been taken in the United States at the beginning of each decade. Census records are released to the public 72 years after the census was taken. The 1940 U.S. Federal Census, released this year, is the largest and most comprehensive collection available containing information about those who were living in the United States at the time. The 1940 census included standard questions about the names, races, ages, and birthplaces of respondents and the people in their households. It also included additional questions about education, income and occupation, and where people lived five years before the census was taken.

#### Number of Household:


Do not confuse the house number (which is recorded in column 2 of the census form) and the number of household (which is recorded in column 3 of the census form). In this project, you will index only the number of household—the number in column 3.

If you need to capture the Household Number and/or the Surname from the previous image and the image is a duplicate, or the numbers are not in the proper sequence, mark these fields blank.

When there is only a T in the number of household field, mark the field blank.

The following questions have been raised about the Ireland Calendar of Wills and Administrations project.

#### Topic: Woman's Maiden Name

**Question**: Under the Field Help it states that a woman's maiden name was often shown following the word 'otherwise,' but how do we know that the 'otherwise' name is a maiden name and not a name from a previous marriage? Should we assume that the 'otherwise' name is a maiden name?

**Answer**: The field help states, "If a woman's maiden name and married surname were both recorded, index all surnames in the Surname field, with the maiden name first. (The maiden name was often shown following the word 'otherwise,' as in 'Margaret Anderson otherwise Payton.')"

This field help does not suggest that all occurrences of the word *otherwise* refer to maiden names. Most often, the word *otherwise* refers to aliases or variants of a person's name. When the calendar entry seems clear that "otherwise" refers to a maiden name (for example, if a sibling's name or parent's name is included in the calendar entry), index name as a maiden name. Otherwise, treat it as referring to an alias name.
