Spelling Variations in German Given and Place Names

Spelling variations within German names occur frequently, and therefore we must be aware of how they impact genealogical research. Spelling variations may be as simple as *Schmidt* to *Schmitt* or as complex as *Eddinger* to *Öttiker*. Basic principles of German phonetics can help us understand these variations and why they occur.


Vowels-aeiouyäöü

Vowels are produced when air passes through the throat and mouth. The location of the tongue and formation of the lips helps to determine which vowel sound will be created.

Common Vowel Alternations

Position of Vowels in the Mouth



Consonants-bcdfghjklmnpqrsßtvwxz

Consonants are produced when air from the throat and mouth is constricted. The movement and position of the lips, tongue, and teeth allow a speaker to articulate certain consonants.

Common Consonant Alternations

Non-phonetic variations

- **The Suffix –in** was often added to a woman's maiden surname. The surname should be extracted without the suffix.
 - o Example: Ursula Bauerin-> Ursula Bauer.
- **Possessive markers** such as s, n, and en were added to the end of surnames to show possession. The surname should be extracted without these endings.
 - o Example: Hans Becken Frau-> Hans Beck.¹
- Latin declinations were added to the end of many given names in Latin records. These names can end with –us, -um, -o, or –i. Remove these endings in order to extract the original German name.
 - o Example: Jacobus, Jacobum, Jacobo, Jacobi-> Jacob.²

• **Meyer's Gazetteer** is the most important German gazetteer. It lists every place name in the German Empire (1871-1918). Using this gazetteer with search techniques will allow you to locate German place names despite spelling variations.

Search Techniques

- Asterisk (*) wildcard: The asterisk wildcard will replace one or more unknown characters. For example, '*dorf' will return Abbendorf, Billendorf, Liedersdorf, etc.
- Beginning of names: Typing the beginning of a name will return all places that start with those letters. For example, 'ober' will return Oberach, Oberadlhof, Ober Alzenau, etc.
- <u>Umlauts:</u> You do not need to include umlauts in your searches nor should you expand them (\u00fc to ue). Searching 'D\u00fcsseldorf' or 'Dusseldorf' will return 'D\u00fcsseldorf'.
- o <u>Filter by region</u>: Once a list of place names appears, you can filter the results by region. This is a helpful resource in locating the correct town. ³
